#### **CAMPUS PROGRAMS**

Edenwald Center is a residential program for children who have been dually-diagnosed with an emotional disturbance as well as an intellectual or developmental disability, including autism-spectrum and neurodevelopmental disorders.

**Gateways** is an intensive treatment program for girls who have been the victims of commercial sexual exploitation and domestic trafficking. It is the only program of its kind in the Northeast.

Pleasantville Cottage School helps children in foster care who have long-term emotional, behavioral, and/or educational challenges.

Pleasantville START is a shortterm, comprehensive diagnostic and treatment program for boys and girls aged 5–17.

#### REPAIR THE WORLD, CHILD BY CHILD: 200 YEARS OF SERVICE & LEADERSHIP

Every year, JCCA cares for **17,000 children and families** with state-of-the-art foster care, educational, behavioral health, and family support services, as well as our **flagship residential program on the Pleasantville Cottage Campus.** Our mission, inspired by the Jewish value of *tikkun olam*, is to repair the world, child by child.

Since 1822, more than one million vulnerable children and families have turned to JCCA for safety, support, and healing. No child and family services organization in the nation can rival our long record of dedication and innovation. 200 years in, we are deeply proud of what we've done. Nevertheless, **our best work is yet to come**.

#### THE PLEASANTVILLE COTTAGE CAMPUS

For more than one hundred years, JCCA has operated one of the most respected residential treatment programs in the United States. Through supportive relationships with medical professionals, therapists, counselors, and volunteers, hundreds of young people who have been neglected or abused find safety, structure, and a space to heal. Their challenges are significant and often therapeutically complex, including intellectual and developmental disabilities, autism, complex trauma, serious emotional disturbance, and histories of commercial sexual exploitation and sexual abuse. Whether they return to a foster or adoptive family, their family of origin, attend college, or join a supportive community for adults with disabilities, young people use the skills they develop on campus to successfully navigate life after they leave our care.

While youth on campus heal from trauma and build confidence and self-reliance, they attend **school**, hold **internships** or part-time **jobs**, and participate in **extracurricular activities**—just like any other child. **Counseling, mentorship, tutoring, and therapeutic recreation** are all integrated into each child's daily schedule.





## CREATING A 21<sup>ST</sup> CENTURY CAMPUS

Throughout our 200 years of existence, the demographics of the New York communities we serve have shifted, and our practices have evolved alongside.

Our history is one of ongoing innovation to meet the needs of the young people who arrive at our doors, with more complex trauma than ever before.



When it opened on July 1, 1912, the Pleasantville campus was widely acknowledged as a pioneering endeavor in the field of child welfare: moving children from teeming city orphanages to bucolic, intimate cottages where they could play outside, attend school, and develop into productive, well-rounded adults. Experts from across the globe came to study our innovative approach. Since then, thousands of children have called JCCA's Pleasantville Campus home—many of them living in the same cottages occupied by their turn-of-the-century forebears.

As we continue to develop our vision of our campus as a safe, nurturing, and enriching environment where young people have every opportunity to thrive, it is time for an update. Specifically, our residents deserve warm, inviting accommodations so they can feel at home. They deserve modern and spacious facilities for therapeutic, social, and recreational activities that provide joy, enrichment, and belonging. They deserve updated electrical wiring for vital basics like modern lighting, climate control, and the ability to use technology to connect to family, friends, and educational resources. They deserve a medical center that is ADA-accessible and suited to their various and often complex health needs.

The momentum of JCCA's 200th anniversary provides the backdrop for a historic Capital Campaign to further these objectives. We have repainted, plastered, and re-purposed our historic buildings for too long. With the support and guidance of JCCA's Board of Trustees, the Capital Campaign will allow us to carry our urgent, groundbreaking work into a third century.





#### COTTAGE RENOVATIONS

As we embark on the next century of visionary and pioneering care for New York's most vulnerable children and their caregivers, we will continue to provide compassionate, cutting edge, and evidence-based approaches that help young people heal and build stable, independent futures.

FAST FACTS



Young people need a caring, home-like environment that supports their therapeutic development, according to their ages, cognitive abilities, and behavioral challenges. To renovate our residential cottages, we will:

- Build open, modern common areas that promote tranquility and comfort along with supervision and safety
- Create bedrooms and spaces that young people can make their "own," instead of feeling like they are in an institutional setting
- Develop integrated, multi-purpose spaces for therapy, small group activities, remote learning, and quiet reflection
- Update cottage lighting, energy, and climate control infrastructure
- Modernize **technological connectivity** to optimize safety, remote learning, and communication with loved ones
- Provide appropriate living spaces for children with specialized sensory and behavioral needs – including specialized lighting, flooring, and furniture


